Senior Denae Warnke Places in Track Competition for the Blind in Tennessee

South O'Brien senior Denae Warnke competed in the Nashville, Tennessee, track meet for blind or visually impaired students last fall.

Warnke is on the Iowa Educational Services for the Blind and Visually Impaired (IESVBI) Rams Track Team. She traveled to Tennessee School for the Deaf with 10 other teammates from Iowa in late September.

The competition involved schools for the blind in the North Central Association for Schools for the Blind Conference. The road trip is as much about navigating new environments and meeting peers as it is about athletic competition.

At the event, Warnke competed in three events, including the long jump, the 60-yard dash, and the shot put. She placed 7th with a distance of 7'8" in the girls' long jump. She placed 13th in the 60-yard dash at a time of 11.80 seconds.

Students were offered the option to use a guidewire if they wanted. Many students benefited from the lanes being brightly marked as well. Warnke said, "I loved spending time with my friends, the amazing staff, and eating the food!"

Warnke also competes in other athletic events for blind and visually impaired students, such as swimming.

She will graduate in May from South O'Brien and plans to attend UNI and possibly majoring in elementary education.

Q: What roles do you have here as a para?


A: As a para, I work with kids one on one and in groups to help give them the best opportunities to learn.




