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Jazz Band Takes First Place to Start the Season

The South O'Brien Jazz Ensemble traveled to Fort Dodge for their first performance of the season. The Triton Jazz Festival was held on Wednesday, January 15, at Iowa Central Community College. Out of 7 bands, South O'Brien earned 1st place. The following received outstanding solo awards: Asa Flinders on trombone, Chloe Hustedt on trumpet, and Alexandra Grimm on tenor and alto saxophone.

The ensemble also performed at the IHSMA Jazz Festival in Spirit Lake, earning a Division 1 rating.

The jazz band typically begins rehearsing at the beginning of November. On Monday, Wednesday, and Friday mornings at 7 am, jazz members can be seen practicing improvisation, leading sectionals, and preparing their music for the next competition. Director Mrs. Meyer explained how the season is going so far, "It

is progressing fairly well. We're making strides in the right direction and constantly improving." As rehearsals began, many members set goals for the band, like striving to succeed at competitions and improving their musicianship. Meyer said, "My goal is for everyone to find a way to come together and work cohesively."

This season, the jazz band is taking three songs to contest. The first is a swing tune titled "Ready Freddie" by Mike Kamuf. It features soloists Brennan Billick, Brett Evans, Chloe Hustedt, Anessa Johnson, and Alexandra Grimm. Featur-

ing Alexandra Grimm on tenor saxophone, "Europa" is a ballad arranged by Eric Richards, originally recorded by Carlos Santana. The third song is "Chili Today, Hot Tamale" by Rick Hirsch. Soloists for this fun Latin tune are Asa Flinders and Ashlynn Gunnerson.

Senior Brett Evans said, "The music that the band picked this year offers a lot of variety among the three tunes. My favorite tune is 'Chili Today, Hot Tamale.' I've always liked the Latin pieces. I love the melodies and what the drum set is playing." Brett has been involved in this

band for four years. He added, "My favorite part about being in jazz band is being the bass trombone. I love playing the low notes, and I like the sound it produces."

The remainder of the season includes performances at the Morningside Jazz Festival in Sioux City, and the

Northwest Iowa Band Association Jazz Band Festival at LeMars Community High School. If they earn 1st or 2nd place at the NWIBA Festival, they will be invited to the state competition in Ames. Meyer is excited about these opportunities for her students. She said, "My favorite

part of directing the band is seeing the students grow from November to the end of the season." On March 4, the ensemble welcomes community members for a night of jazz at the South O'Brien Elementary School.

This milestone was achieved on Friday, Jan. 17, in a game against West Sioux at Hawarden. To celebrate the 400th win, Coach Yates was presented with a plaque and a poster of his past teams and accomplishments. Coach Yates stated, "This accomplishment has happened

through longevity. It happens from talented players and great assistant coaches. It also has a lot to do with the supportive community that we live in. My wife Melanie also plays a large part in my ability to coach and do what I need to do to get the team ready."

Athletic Director Heath Reichle presented him with the plaque, and seniors Derek Paulsen and Caden Wittrock presented him with the poster. Coach Yates had this to say about the winning culture at South O'Brien.

"It starts with great kids from great families. I start to build relationships and develop skills with the players while they are young. Programs are built from the top down. If you put together a great varsity team, the younger players want to be a part of that. Getting a varsity uniform is a big deal because kids have worked thousands of hours to earn that uniform." Yates teaches social studies and is currently the president of the Iowa Basketball Coaches Association.

Speech Groups Earn High Rating to Compete at State

Three South O'Brien High School speech groups earned Division I ratings to advance to State Speech while competing at Districts on Saturday, January 28. Radio Broadcasting, Readers Theater, and Group Improv will now compete on Saturday, February 8, at Spencer High School. Speech Coach Mrs. Kim Poeckes said, "Participating in speech helps students build essential skills like effective communication, creative thinking, and teamwork. Taking it to the next level by competing in a speech contest allows them to join a diverse community of peers from different backgrounds."

Freshmen Kate Dau, Owen Oliver, and senior Bryce Williams make up the Radio Broadcasting team. The contestants create a 5-to 6-minute broadcast about state, local, national, and international, sports, and news. The entries include short commercial videos from traditional radio news, podcasts, audio blogs, or other audio forms. Freshman Kate Dau said, "I went out for speech due to my passion for public speaking, and I especially enjoy creating the podcast." This year the South O'Brien radio broadcast is about history in the state of Iowa. They talk about American Prohibition and highlight the events that happened in Iowa at the time.
